2015 Water Supply Update

We are off to another good water year here in Natomas. After months of working with the USBR and the State Water Board, we were again successful in ensuring our 75% water supply allocation for 2015. At this level of allocation, Natomas will be able to provide its shareholders adequate water for the historically irrigated fields within the Company. To achieve the 75% supply we have agreed to not exceed last year's monthly river diversions amounts. With conjunctive use and other efficiency improvements this will not be a problem but continued water conservation is essential. Our operations staff will continue to operate the system in an efficient manner and work with our growers on water efficiency. Thanks you in advance for your cooperation and assistance during this fourth year of drought.

Board members:

We just received written confirmation that the Natomas Central Mutual Water Company will receive 75 percent of its water supply allocation for 2015. While the good news comes late (which confounds planting decisions), it is a very significant piece of news for the Conservancy and its ability to keep marsh complexes fully functional, to keep upland crops in production for the benefit of avian species, and also to meet the Conservancy's 2015 budget.

As was clear from the heavy political push by senior elected officials that participation in the groundwater exchange program by the Natomas Central Mutual Water Company was an essential factor in obtaining the 75 percent allocation decision.

We will have more on this at the upcoming Board of Directors meeting. But for now, we wanted to make sure Board members were aware of this critically important news.

Thank you very much.

Reading the words in your email, very carefully, I am worried.

If there is some question about the Conservancy's authority to hold and manage lands, there is something bordering on a massive problem. If so, we'd need to check with the Department's legal counsel, since it evidenced in both federal and state court that the Conservancy did in fact have that authority, that the authority was certain and unequivocal, and that there was assured funding for it to hold and manage HCP mitigation land.

If this process as noted below could unwind all of that, that is, if the Conservancy's authority is in question, then you can see there would be questions about state misrepresentation, among many other consequences.

Did your due diligence review affirm the Conservancy's ability and authority to hold and manage land, or did it not?

Thanks for your attention to this request. It is a HUGE deal for the Conservancy and the State, and we need to be precise and clear on exactly what is at stake here.

This is public information.

We wanted to update the Board on the groundwater exchange program for 2015 and the memorial service of Scot Mende.

Groundwater exchange program. The target date for activation of the program was today, but as of this writing, no groundwater production had been authorized. However, as of this morning, the Biological Opinion had been completed and delivered. By noon, contracts had been delivered to the Natomas Central Mutual Water Company (NCMWC) from the Bureau of Reclamation. NCMWC hoped that by the end of the day, the purchaser of the NCMWC groundwater exchange program water, the Delta Mendota Water Agency, would finalize the amount of water it was willing to pay for. Based on all this, the earliest the Conservancy's groundwater wells would be operating as a participant in this program would be tonight.

Yesterday, there was a late glitch where three of the Conservancy's groundwater wells were subject to being determined ineligible for participation based on federal and state government requirements. Thanks to the excellent records and retrieval system Conservancy staffers Jennifer and Valerie have in place, the Conservancy was able to submit documentation that resolved the issue, and we heard back that the extent of the response and speed of the response was exemplary. So it now appears that 100 percent of the Conservancy's participating wells will be generating water for the program.

Scot Mende memorial service. On another matter, the funeral service for the City of Sacramento's Scot Mende was yesterday afternoon. I attended the service on behalf of the Conservancy. Mayor Kevin Johnson delivered one of the eulogies, and former Mayor Heather Fargo officiated. It was standing-room only and attendees overflowed into the hallways and doorways. There were many kind and heart-warming statements about Scot at the service, and each and every one of them was deserved. There has never been a bigger supporter, defender and protector of the Conservancy than Scot. At times, I do not know what we will do without him.



Dear John:

We were saddened to learn of the passing of the City's New Growth Manager, Scot Mende. Besides being a dedicated and hard working City employee, he was very much a great guy. He will be sorely missed.

With Scot's passing is the loss of a great deal of institutional memory with respect to Natomas and the City's obligations under the Natomas Basin Habitat Conservation Plan (NBHCP). The many rounds of extended litigation, the City's strategies to resolve federal and state endangered species act issues, where compliance issues are easy and where they are challenging, City commitments on mitigation of selected trees, etc. The list is seemingly endless.

The Conservancy is the City's "Plan Operator" for the NBHCP, and we hold a good deal of knowledge that may be useful to the City as it transitions from Scot's skilled hand to whomever it is that replaces him. To reduce the City's obligation to its barest, most simple form, there are three actions required with respect to the City's compliance with the agreements it has with the state and federal government in this regard:

- 1.) determine if HCP fees are paid prior to issuance of a grading permit,
- 2.) ensure that the "take minimization practices" the City has agreed to are followed with each project, and
- 3.) report annually to the federal and state government (among others) on the number of acres of the Permit used and fees collected.

Please feel free to offer our availability to meet with and support City staff in matters pertaining to development in Natomas and compliance with the terms and conditions of the City's Incidental Take Permit and more generally, obligations under the NBHCP. We're here to serve. We'd be honored to help.

Dear John:

Thank you very much for reaching out to us at this very difficult time. The loss of Scot Mende was sudden and profound. As you acknowledge in your letter, Scot's dedication and humor were hallmarks of his outstanding character. His knowledge of Natomas history is difficult to replace.

The easing of building restrictions this year signals the beginning of a new era in Natomas. To that end, the City has been preparing to issue building permits again for some time now. Along with that comes the continued responsibility of carrying out the obligations prescribed by the Natomas Basin Habitat Conservation Plan (NBHCP).

We are in the process of transitioning Scot's numerous work responsibilities to other staff members within the Community Development Department. The new Senior Planner in the Natomas area will be Lindsey Alagozian (916-808-2659, lalagozian@cityofsacramento.org). Lindsey worked in the Natomas area from 2007-2014 and is familiar with many of the projects and developers. She will serve as the primary point of contact for proposed Natomas development through the entitlement process.

Some Large Foreign Companies Reject Compliance Chief Role

Some of the largest foreign companies reject the need for having a chief compliance officer, a role widely seen as important among large U.S. companies and U.S. regulators alike.

Japanese car-maker <u>Toyota Motor</u> Corp., Russian energy conglomerate <u>OAO Gazprom</u> and Italian energy company <u>Eni</u> SpA said to Risk & Compliance Journal they don't include that position in their executive ranks. Instead, Toyota and Eni say they use committees to handle compliance, while Gazprom said its internal controls function is "distributed among several divisions depending on the field of responsibility," and those divisions report to different top managers.

Most major U.S. companies have a chief compliance officer. U.S. laws don't mandate companies to have that position, but regulators say companies need a compliance program in place to

ensure an organization follows the law. Many governance experts say companies should have a single person overseeing corporate compliance matters, with a staff enforcing rules, developing policies and conducting training exercises.

"The role is critical, because if it's misaligned, that's when you have problems," said Pamela Passman, president and chief executive at the Center for Responsible Enterprise and Trade, or CRATe, a non-government organization that helps companies prevent piracy, trade-secret theft and corruption.

Eni made the case to Risk & Compliance Journal that its compliance program is effective, even without a CCO role. Its arrangement is "based on a logic of competences," with compliance responsibilities divided among committee members who periodically report to the relevant committees at the board of directors, said Erika Mandraffino, a spokeswoman.

The company's compliance committee features some of its top officials, including the chief legal and regulatory affairs officer; the corporate affairs and governance senior executive vice president; the head of internal audit and the executive vice president of human resources, she said. The committee, Ms. Mandraffino said, provides advice and support concerning compliance and governance matters.

She said the committee reports to the chief executive on any pressing new compliance issues. Members of the compliance committee also participate in business strategy meetings, said Ms. Mandraffino.

Toyota declined to explain the thinking behind its approach to compliance, and Gazprom didn't respond to requests for further comment.

The significance of the chief compliance officer role came to the fore in the wake of a corruption scandal surrounding Brazil's state-run oil firm <u>Petroleo Brasileiro</u> SA. The company, still dealing with the fallout of a widening scandal, hired an executive in January to lead a newly created compliance division, which a Petrobras spokeswoman said in an email was established to "ensure the compliance of processes and mitigate risks, including those of fraud and corruption."

"Our goal is to turn Petrobras into a benchmark in governance, risk and compliance," the spokeswoman said.

Although Petrobras said its creation of a compliance chief position was intended to reduce compliance risk, many companies with executives in that role have been penalized for breaking laws on bribery, money laundering, sanctions and other compliance areas.

Still, some experts say lacking an individual chief compliance officer opens companies up to

more risk.

"Compliance depends on one very important principle, and that's accountability," said Mike Volkov, who leads the Volkov Law Group, a boutique firm that specializes in compliance. Mr. Volkov said the absence of a formally designated chief ethics and compliance officer "demonstrates an insensitivity and lack of awareness" regarding compliance as a basic tenet of a corporate framework.

"To the extent that non-U.S. companies operate with those blinders, they set themselves up for future prosecutions, large fines and penalties by U.S. prosecutors," said Mr. Volkov.

Other experts disagreed, saying the formal role is less important than having a coherent program.

"[Compliance] can take many forms, but what you want to be able to do is to lay it out on the table. Put the various elements, activities and controls that, together, represent your organization's compliance program," said Scott Moritz, a managing director at risk consultancy Protiviti.

Even if someone doesn't have the title of "chief compliance officer," said Ms. Passman, there has to be a person, or group of people, at an organization who have the authority to put in place an effective compliance program and ensure the independence of a compliance staff.

"You need a person whose job description includes the development, the management and the enforcement of a compliance program," said Ms. Passman.
